Stanley A. McCollough was born on the Family Farm in Fairview Township, Butler County on January 10, 1926. He was the last of six boys and two girls of Oliver M. and Elizabeth H. (Garing) McCollough. He was Baptized, Confirmed and a life-long member of The First English Lutheran Church, in Chicora. He served on the Church Council as President many times including when three churches merged and built Holy Trinity Lutheran Church on the former McCollough farm.

Patricia Craig agreed to married Stanley on July 19, 1949. They built their first house in 1956 on 2.5 acres on Route 68 near Chicora where they lived until moving to their present address at Hidden Meadows in Renfrew in 2003.

Stanley attended Fairview Township Karns City High School and graduated in May 1944. He continued his education at Butler Community College as an Apprentice Student while working at Armco, Penn Technical Institute, and many advanced education night classes at Butler High School.

He served his country when he enlisted in the Army Air Core Aviation Cadet Program while still in high school and entered basic training in May 1944, then to Armament School on B-24 planes, and then to gunnery school. He then joined Crew #68 in the 5th Air Force 22nd Bomb Group, Second Squadron, South Pacific. After the war he came home and was in the inactive reserves when in 1950, Brother and President Harry S. Truman sent Stanley a telegram that he had a critical M.O.S. and ended up the 2nd time on Okinawa with the 307 Bomb Group. He was finally honorably discharged from inactive reserves in 1952.

Stanley was always an industrious person as he started working nights, Saturdays and Sundays with Working Papers from school at the Starlight Refinery Company in Karns City. After his Military Service he worked at the Pennsylvania Refining Company, Spang Magnetices, Inc., Standard Packing and finally at Armco, Inc. , Butler where he retired in 1989 as General Project Supervisor in Management Control.

His Masonic resume is impressive as he was always an active member in all the Bodies he belonged. He started his Masonic Journey when he joined Argyle Lodge No. 540 in 1961, serving as Worshipful Master in 1966 and 1974. The Chicora Masonic Building Association was started in his living room in 1975, when Argyle Lodge decided to build a New Masonic Home across Route 68 from Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, again on the old McCollough Farm. The Lodge was dedicated in 1976.

He joined the Valley of New Castle A.A.S.R. in 1962 where he served as Sovereign Prince in 1981 and received a Silver and Gold Ribbons for getting new members in 1980. He was coroneted a Thirty Third Degree Mason in Boston in 1987. He belongs to the New Castle Legion of Honor and serves on the Children's Dyslexia Center Board of Directors. He has major parts in the cast of the 15^o and 26^o. He joined the Royal Order of Scotland in 1994.

He joined the Syria Shine in 1962, where he became active with the Syria Deputy Unit (President in 1980), Syria Hillbilly Clan 53, Caravan #14 (President in 1980), Syria Legion of Honor (Commander 1994), and Butler Knights and Nobles Charities (President 1987). He was appointed an Ambassador and an Aid to several Potentates.

York Rite memberships include Butler Chapter No. 273, Butler Council No. 61 and Lorraine Commandery No. 87 all of which he joined in 1970. He belongs to Antioch Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine (1997).

Stanley is a credit to our Masonic Fraternity and we are proud to name the 2011 Spring Class in his honor.

The Double-Headed Eagle



The Double-Headed Eagle of Lagash is the oldest Royal Crest in the world. No heraldic bearing, no emblematic device of today can boast such antiquity. It was in use a thousand years before the Exodus from Egypt and more than 2,000 years before the building of King Solomon's Temple. So far as is known, the Double-Headed Eagle was first used in Freemasonry in 1758 by a Masonic Body in Paris. The Emperors of the East and West controlled the advanced Degrees then in use and became a precursor of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite.

WHAT IS AN ACTIVE MEMBER?

The Supreme Council, 33°, the governing body of the Scottish Rite, has sole responsibility for laws and regulations, rituals, finances, supervision and control of the Rite. The headquarters of the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction is in Lexington, Massachusetts.

Governing of the Rite is vested in the Active Members, the number of which seldom exceeds fifty. Each State is entitled to at least one Active Member. An Active Member is not the representative of his State in the Supreme Council, but rather the representative of the Supreme Council in his State. The Active Members transact the business of the Supreme Council in executive and general sessions.

Active Members are selected from among the honorary members who attend, and have a voice in the general sessions of the Supreme Council, but have no vote.

THE NEW CASTLE SCOTTISH RITE CATHEDRAL

Our home is the reality of a dream of John S. Wallace, 33, who lived next door to where the Cathedral now stands. The land was purchased in 1918 with additional plots acquired in 1921, 1923 and 1924. The architect was Schmidt and the contractor was S. M. Seisel from Milwaukee. The cornerstone was laid in 1925. The first time the building was officially used was November 8, 1926.

The Cathedral is 244 feet by 181 feet. At the front of the building are six stone columns that are 32 feet tall. The lobby is 70 feet in length and 24 feet in depth and suspended from the ceiling, forty five feet above, are three stained glass chandeliers flanked by eighteen massive pillars of onyx scagliola.

Adjoining the lobby is the 2,800 seat auditorium. Enhancing the beauty of the auditorium are three main chandeliers that were specifically designed and constructed for the cathedral. The Stage is 80 feet in width, 45 feet in depth and 65 feet to the gridiron.

In addition to the auditorium, the cathedral is equipped with four banquet rooms: The main dining room (seats 720), the east and west dining rooms (seats 320 each), and the ball room (seats 300). We can seat and serve around 1,800 at one time.

There are also two beautiful Masonic meeting halls, one on the east side and one on the west side of the building. In all, there is 2,900,000 square feet of floor area.

Meeting the challenge of dyslexia.

A small boy sits at his desk, looking down at his open book as his classmates read aloud. He wrinkles his forehead and squints his eyes but the letters and words he sees are jumbled, twisted, senseless. He grips the book tighter, holds his breath and makes a silent wish that the teacher will not call on him... This child has dyslexia, a common learning disability. He needs help to overcome it before it sets him back emotionally as well as educationally. Where will he get the help he needs? Mary had a little lamb. These familiar lines are easy to read and fun for most school-aged children. But for a child with dyslexia, reading brings nothing but frustration. Here's the same passage as seen through the eyes of a child with dyslexia: Mar gha dal it tie lamd. With letters flipped and words broken in the wrong places, the passage is simply impossible to read. It's easy to see why a child with dyslexia loses interest in reading, writing and other academics. Without specialized help, these children face serious stumbling blocks throughout their school years and beyond. Techniques that use a variety of senses - such as drawing letter shapes in a sand tray - give children alternative ways to learn. The 32° Masonic Learning Centers for Children, Inc. has been created specifically for the purpose of providing free specialized training and tutoring to children with dyslexia. It is the aim of the Learning Centers to equip these children with the skills and confidence they need to approach learning with eagerness and without fear.

New Castle Children's Dyslexia Center of Western PA

32° Freemasons Helping Children;
Reading and writing are two of the most critical
skills we can teach our children.
Children with Dyslexia have difficulty with these skills.
Our mission... to help children learn to read and write.

The Learning Center in New Castle opened its doors in 2004 and currently has 8 tutoring rooms, 36 active students, one director, 9 tutors, 5 trainees, and 6 students on the waiting list. All the tutoring rooms are located in the New Castle Scottish Rite Cathedral.

What is dyslexia?

It manifests primarily as a difficulty with written language, particularly with reading and spelling. It is separate and distinct from reading difficulties resulting from other causes, such as a non-neurological deficiency with vision or hearing, or from poor or inadequate reading instruction. Evidence also suggests that dyslexia results from differences in how the brain processes written and/or spoken language. Although dyslexia is allegedly the result of a neurological difference, it is not an intellectual disability. Dyslexia has been diagnosed in people possessing all levels of intelligence. Dyslexia is an impairment in your brain's ability to translate written images received from your eyes into meaningful language. Also called specific reading disability, dyslexia is the most common learning disability in children, affecting 5 percent or more of all elementary-age children. Dyslexia may occur in children with normal vision and normal intelligence. Children with dyslexia usually have normal speech, but often have difficulty interpreting spoken language and writing. Treatment for dyslexia may involve a multisensory education program. Emotional support of your child on your part also plays an important role. Perhaps dyslexia can be most easily defined by looking at the word itself. The word dyslexia, pronounced (dis-lek-see-uh) comes from the Greek words $\delta\upsilon\sigma$ - dys- ("impaired or without") and $\lambda\acute{\epsilon}\xi\iota\varsigma$ lexis ("word"). DYSLEXIA means: WITHOUT WORDS.

We're making a difference for children with dyslexia.

Dyslexia is estimated to affect some 15% of our population - more than 2 million school-age children in the United States. Although these children typically have average or above-average intelligence, their dyslexia can create difficulties not only with reading, writing and spelling but also with listening, thinking, talking and arithmetic. These academic problems can lead to emotional and self-esteem problems throughout their lives. With early diagnosis and appropriate instruction, these children can learn - and can enjoy learning - at their own age level. But programs to treat dyslexia have been few and far between. Most communities have little or no funding to support the facilities and staffing needed to properly address this disability.

Setting high standards.

Each Learning center provides a highly qualified staff specially trained in the treatment of dyslexia. After professional assessment and evaluation of a student's needs, the staff then provides customized one-on-one instruction using a variety of techniques. In addition, each Learning Center provides training for local teachers or volunteers who want to tutor children with dyslexia.

A MESSAGE TO CANDIDATES

When you become a Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret by receiving the Thirty-Second degree and are no better than when you began your adventure, your investment of time and money will have been in vain. Many men have been reborn, intellectually and spiritually, during the conferring of these Degrees. It is the hope and prayer of the Brethren that your experiences may be rich and significant.

While each of you is our guest of the Scottish Rite Bodies, you are requested to observe certain regulations and to cooperate closely with the Class Marshals so that confusion and delay may be avoided as much as possible. A definite time schedule is necessary and can only be maintained through the cooperation of all, including each and every candidate.

A full program of degree exemplification has been scheduled and a concerted effort has been made to present the degrees scheduled in a manner that will be an inducement to our candidates to return many times to witness additional Scottish Rite Degrees.

Through the use of authentic costuming, realistic scenery, effective lighting, music, and the beautiful language of the ritual, these degrees become highly dramatic presentations. Certainly, they should inspire and enable everyone who witnesses them with an open heart and open mind to have a better understanding of the precepts of Freemasonry as a way of life and a deeper concept of his responsibilities as a man and Mason.

This, we believe, is highly important because we are at a time when the time-tested principles that are so dear to Masons everywhere and that are so fundamental to our American way of life are being seriously challenged and threatened. The need for a better understanding of the precepts of Freemasonry and a more determined resolve to carry our Masonic light into the world becomes increasingly urgent.

We always look forward to each Scottish Rite Reunion as an opportunity to greet old friends and to make new and lasting acquaintances, and let us never forget or underestimate the value of true friendship. As we are taught in one of our degrees, life without friends, indeed, is worthless.

We sincerely hope that you will avail yourselves of the opportunity at this Reunion to rededicate your lives to the precepts of our beloved Fraternity. We shall endeavor to make your attendance both enjoyable and rewarding, and to make this Reunion one of the best ever.

The Chivalric Degrees of the Consistory

19° Grand Pontiff. This degree proclaims the spiritual unity of all who believe in God and cherish the hope of immortality, no matter what religious leader they follow or what creed they profess. It is primarily concerned with the perennial conflict between light and darkness, good and evil, God and Satan.

20° Master Ad Vitam. This degree demonstrates the Masonic condemnation of all who conspire against the security of the nation and the happiness of our people.

21° Patriarch Noachite. This degree teaches Freemasonry is not a shield for evil doing and that justice is one of the chief supports of our fraternity.

22° Prince of Libanus. In this degree, the dignity of labor is demonstrated. It is no curse, but a privilege, for a man to be allowed to earn his sustenance by work. Idleness, not labor, is disgraceful.

23° Knight of Valor. This degree teaches that impure thoughts and selfish, unworthy ambitions are corrupting and destructive, and that a man who forgets his duty to family, country, and God will be morally and spiritually destroyed.

24° Brother of the Forest. In this degree we discover that a Scottish Rite Mason should not judge any man by his race or by anything except his own acts.

25° Master of Achievement. Dramatizing events in the life of Brother Benjamin Franklin, this degree shows us that an industrious life benefits not only ourselves but also humanity.

26° Friend and Brother Eternal. From a true incident during the American Civil War we learn that partisan strife does not dissolve our Masonic obligations and that the virtues of brotherhood give rise to good citizenship.

27° Knight of Jerusalem. The lesson of this degree illustrates the importance of a free church in a free state, each cooperating toward the common good.

28° Knight of the Sun. This degree teaches that as nature hides her treasures under an external coat which must be hewn away before her wonders can be put to use by man, so Freemasonry helps us to strip the vices and superfluities of our lives so that we can see and perform our duty to God and our fellow man.

29° Knights of St. Andrew. This degree emphasizes the Masonic teachings of equality and toleration. We are reminded that no one man, no one church, no one religion, has a monopoly of truth; that while we must be true and faithful to our own convictions, we must respect the opinions of others.

30° Grand Inspector. This degree teaches us to be attentive, impartial, and equitable in judging others.

31° Knight Aspirant. This degree describes the victory of the spiritual over the human in man and the conquest of appetites and passions by moral sense and reason. The exemplar represents every Freemason eager to serve humanity but caught between self-interest and the call of duty. Duty often requires sacrifice, sometimes the supreme sacrifice.

32° Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret. As the culmination of Scottish Rite Masonry, this degree celebrates the triumph of individual integrity and our obligation to serve humanity.

LESSONS OF THE SCOTTISH RITE DEGREES

The Ineffable Degrees of the Lodge of Perfection

4° Master Traveler. This degree is to introduce the candidate to the totality of the Scottish Rite experience at the threshold. Moral challenges or dilemmas are posed to the candidate.

5° Perfect Master. This degree teaches that trustworthiness is more precious than life and is the foundation of Masonic honor. Also, we must pay due respect to the memory of a deceased worthy Brother.

6° Master of the Brazen Serpent. We learn from this degree that we must have faith in ourselves, faith in each other, and faith in God.

7° Provost and Judge. This degree teaches us to judge righteously, without respect to person, and that one law and one custom shall apply to all. Let justice be impartial, tempered with deserved mercy.

8° Intendant of the Building. This degree teaches that each new honor is meant to be a step toward perfection in the moral code; each a development of a particular duty; and that benevolence and charity are necessary virtues of leadership

9° Master of the Temple. This degree teaches that a mutual belief in a Supreme Power should bind all men together in a world-wide brotherhood.

10° Master Elect. We learn in this degree that a person who violates his obligations, regardless of his station in life, will not go unpunished.

11° Sublime Master Elected. This degree dwells on good citizenship. Evil doings should be punished. Honesty and respect for others should be rewarded. Be earnest, honest and sincere.

12° Master of Mercy. Exemplified in this degree is the quality of forgiveness, not just to forego the opportunity for revenge, but to cease to feel enmity or resentment toward the transgressor

13° Master of the Ninth Arch. This degree teaches that difficulties and dangers, however great, should not deter the true and faithful brother from progressing onward to perfection. It teaches the great truth that the finest things in life come only as the result of constant and often painful effort.

14° Grand Elect Mason. This degree teaches the holiness of God and reverence for His Holy Name.

The Historical Degrees of the Council of Princes of Jerusalem

15° Knight of the East. This lesson of this degree emphasizes the importance of loyalty to our beliefs and fidelity to an obligation.

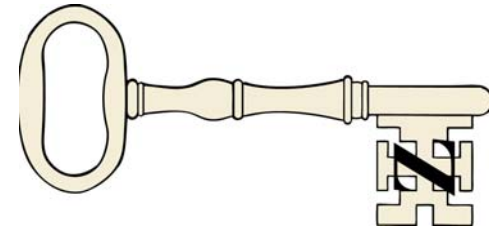
16° Prince of Jerusalem. This degree teaches loyalty to truth and fidelity to duty.

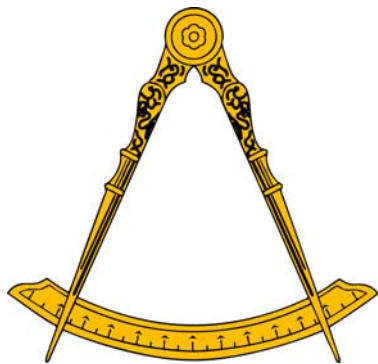

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE SCOTTISH RITE **(Northern Masonic Jurisdiction)**

The Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, of the United States of America, consists of fifteen states north of the Mason-Dixon Line and east of the Mississippi River. The Supreme Council Headquarters is in Lexington, Massachusetts where the presiding officer is Ill. John Wm. McNaughton, 33°, Sovereign Grand Commander.

Each of the fifteen states has a Deputy who is an Active Member of the Supreme Council. The Deputy for Pennsylvania is Ill. William L. McCarrier, 33°, Past Commander in Chief of the Valley of New Castle. At the present time, Pennsylvania has five Active Members including the Deputy, plus four Active Emeritus Members (one who is Ill. Drew W. Washabau, 33°, Past Commander in Chief of the Valley of New Castle).

As of July 1, 2010 there were 101 Valleys in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction. Each Valley has a Lodge of Perfection, 14°, 94 have a Council Princes of Jerusalem, 16°, 90 have a Chapter of Rose Croix 18°, and 68 have a Consistory, 32°. Pennsylvania has sixteen Lodges of Perfection and twelve Consistories.

The membership in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction as of July 1, 2010 was 171,230 14° Masons. Pennsylvania has the largest membership in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction with 43,652 fourteen degree Masons. Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania has 114,447 members.

New Castle Consistory, 32°, had 4,640 on July 1, 2010. The Valley of New Castle has every right to be proud of its membership. We have members who are leaders in the National, State, County, City and Local Governments, members who are prominent in the industries of our State and leaders in every walks of life. Our membership reaches into every state in the United States and into many foreign countries.

New Castle Consistory, 32° meets on the third Wednesday of January, March, June and September in the Scottish Rite Cathedral, New Castle, at 7:30 PM.

Its Jurisdiction is absolute in Lawrence County and concurrent in all other counties in Pennsylvania where there is no Scottish Rite Body of the same grade.

Required qualification: A petitioner for degrees and membership must be an Affiliated Master Mason in good standing, a resident of this State and the Jurisdiction of Bodies for six months. The petition must be recommended by two members and accompanied by a fee of \$150.00.

The Annual Dues for all the New Castle Scottish Rite Bodies is \$76.00 and are payable in advance on the first day of April of each year.

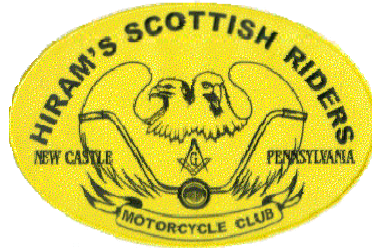
